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which is over ten years old, it has 421,000 miles on it, running very, very well, and it may not have a sale value of \$500. So what Senator Tyson told us his used car buddy told him explains and demonstrates exactly why used car dealers lack credibility. For him to dismiss Senator Tyson's question in that manner probably was done because he knows that Senator Tyson would not drive anything with a value, no matter how you reckoned it, of under 10 or \$12,000. But for the rest of us and people who do have to buy these cars, which used car dealers, by the way, will sell, a car with a value of \$500 is not necessarily a piece of junk to them, it is not necessarily inoperable. Since Senator Tyson is going to encumber some committee with his nonmeritorious bill, I think we ought to just let that committee go on and do its work. Go through the hearing, then carry out what I read during the first days of the session is the most important duty of the Legislature, that's to kill bad bills. I'm opposed to his amendment. And if it's added to this bill, this bill could become a session-delayer, if not a session-stopper. And I think it's not necessary that this bill, which has a very worthwhile purpose, should be bogged down with a side issue such as that. Senator Bromm, based on some of the things Senator Beutler was asking you, I'd like to pose a question to you about a provision of the committee amendments which would be new language. In subsection (e), on the first page, this vehicle, if left more than 30 days in the custody of this law enforcement agency, after a certain letter had been sent to the owner, the last registered owner, just think about adding some language to the effect "if such owner has not expressed an intent to reclaim such vehicle". A pers... a car... What they do in Omaha, if your car is reported stolen and the police find it, they'll put it in the impound lot, not always notify you, and you have to pay to get your car back after having reported it stolen. So let's say you have a nice vehicle, and you're making payments on it, and it was reported stolen, and they've held it for more than 30 days, and write you a letter saying, if you don't come on and get this, it's ours. We ought to give the person an opportunity to express an intent to reclaim that car so that... I know you all believe in law enforcement people implicitly. You don't think they lie, you don't think they cheat, you don't think they steal. Even the one from the State Patrol demonstrated all of that very recently, and was given just a slap on the hands. I don't trust
