where I'm thinking about the person who may be forgotten, generally, even though people as rich as Senator Tyson may, on occasion, have to have transit stickers on his car. But that's what this amendment would do, and I hope you will see the value of it. I want to add that Senator Bromm and his staff worked with me, once I raised this question, to get this language together. So I'm offering it to you this morning.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Cudaback, to speak to the Chambers amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker and members, I'm in full support of this amendment. The idea here is not to take a vehicle, just go out and grab it. The idea here is to do...to give the owner every possibility to get the vehicle, if possible. So I'm in full support of the in-transit amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Bromm, to speak to the Chambers...

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. President. I just rise briefly to say that I support the amendment, and I appreciate Senator Chambers' raising the issue, because I think it just hadn't been thought of and was not in the statutes. But certainly if someone has a valid in-transit tag or decal on the car, we wouldn't want that to be a technicality that caused them to have the car towed away and treated as an abandoned vehicle. So I certainly would support the amendment to the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Chambers, there are no other lights on. Closing is waived. The issue before the body is the Chambers amendment to the committee amendments. Those in favor please vote aye, those opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Chambers' amendment to the committee amendments.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. The Chambers' amendment is adopted. Anything further on the committee amendments?
