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have as a triggering mechanism for the performing of an autopsy?
Would you agree with that?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, I clearly think that's the lowest threshold.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And that's the only...

SENATOR BRASHEAR: If there's any question at all,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...the intent of this legislation is that an autopsy will be performed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And that will take care of what the concern was that I had. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion on the committee amendments? Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. President, I just have one question, I guess, of Senator Brashear, after the comment or question that Senator Beutler brought up.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Brashear.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Senator Brashear. In cases in the rural areas, and I'm speaking from experience here, on deaths a lot of times the county attorney has given the authority to the sheriff to act as coroner in those cases. And would this change that to where the county attorney would have to make this decision, or would somebody, given the responsibility from the county attorney, be able to do it? Do you know?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Senator Schmitt, I believe that we are in no way affecting positively or negatively any existing lawful delegation of authority from the county attorney to any other person. It's not at issue in this bill. So whatever it is, it is. Presumably, if what has...if what you are hypothesizing
