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regarding fraternities and sororities, where the building may be owned by the state and leased by the sorority. I will leave...both you and Senator Hilgert are attorneys and I am not. I will leave it to you whether the lessee, pardon me, the lessor, pardon me, lessee, I'm sorry, I'll get it straight, has control over the building for which they're paying lease payments.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: The purport of my amendment is if the state owns the building you can't smoke in it.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, and if somebody else owns the building and the state leases the space, can you smoke in the leased space?

SENATOR TYSON: Not in those portions where the state is the occupant, no.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: If that's the entire building, that's a state building and the answer would be no.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, it seems to me it would not be harmful on Select File to perhaps clarify that and make it more specific in the amendment. Let me ask you about the logical next step on this progression. Would you have objection to a further amendment that would continue the prohibition to political subdivisions generally, as opposed to just the state buildings, but all political subdivision buildings?

SENATOR TYSON: No, I would have not...I would have no objection, Senator.

SENATOR BEUTLER: It's...it's interesting how the political progression of things is from one small step to another, even though the logic applies across the board. Know, right now, in private offices,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.
