law which would prohibit tobacco use in all public buildings and then semi-public buildings. Senator Landis, as a good lawyer, and by that I mean one learned in the law, knows that there are private entities affected with a public interest and they are treated as though they are public entities and they have the same duty to the public that a public entity would have. So, after we get past those truly public buildings, then buildings which might be privately owned but are affected with a public interest can be next on the list. But, as one boxer was saying to another when he asked, what are you going to do with my nose when we get in the ring, he said, I'll cross that bridge when I come to it. So we'll cross those other bridges when we come to it. I would like to correct something that Senator Preister had said. Harold Clarke is the Director of Corrections, not the warden. He used to be the warden, but now he's the Director of Corrections. While I'm using the word "corrections", I want to add something that I'm surprised Senator Tyson didn't add, being the scholar that he is. This building is the Ninth Wonder of the World. How many knew that? This building is the Ninth Wonder of the World and, as such, it is entitled to protection. It should be cherished.
