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moderation, Senator Coordsen.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. The Chair recognizes Senator Janssen on the Tyson amendment.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. Members of the Legislature, it's my understanding that the Tyson, Senator Tyson's amendment would prohibit smoking in all state buildings. Senator Beutler brought up the fact that it could be...you could construe this that if a fraternity house was leased from the state by the fraternity and that would be...that would be different. I'm not sure of that. Several years ago we had a no smoking bill before the Legislature that was similar to this, but at that time, if I remember correctly, the university was exempt. Senator Tyson, could you respond to a question, please?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Tyson.

SENATOR TYSON: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Tyson, would the university still be exempt?

SENATOR TYSON: Not if it's a state building, no.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. So...so you're saying that all state buildings, that would include the university?

SENATOR TYSON: Yes, it would include the university.

SENATOR JANSSEN: So the students at the University of Nebraska could no longer then smoke in their rooms, in the dining room, in the rest rooms, nowhere inside of that...

SENATOR TYSON: Any building owned by the state, yes, Senator.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. Would that...they could outside on the grounds of the university then?

SENATOR TYSON: No, in the building.
