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SENATOR JANSSEN: Just in the building.

SENATOR TYSON: If they wanted to smoke on the grounds, that's fine. If it is a blizzard and they want to look like Lot's wife, that's fine.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay.

SENATOR TYSON: It's up to them.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. Thank you. Thank you, Senator Tyson. Well, this is a concern of mine because, as you all know, that usually that's where a lot of young people are introduced to some of the...some of the not so nice things in our society, and which smoking is one of them. As, you know, I am a reformed smoker. Gosh, I used to puff it, chew it, do anything with it but...and I don't anymore so that...so I'm off the hook. I am not hooked anymore on nicotine. But at the young age of these students, I think that is where those habits are developed. I can remember friends of mine would come home from school that in high school they were...they were real strait-laced kids. They come home and there they were puffing on a cigar or a cigarette, so that's where they learn these things. Hopefully, this would...this would include the University of Nebraska and it would not be exempt, as it was a few years ago. And I had people call me, say, why aren't you supporting that bill? Well, I said, as soon as we include the University of Nebraska I would support it, but that bill at that time failed to advance. So, with that, hopefully, I have the understanding now that the university would fall underneath this. That is fine. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Seeing no further lights, the Chair recognizes Senator Tyson, to close on his amendment.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. Members of the body, I thank those who have spoken on this bill. I think that the bill either has merit or it does not. If you believe that it does, vote for it. If you believe it does not, please abstain. And I would appreciate your votes. Thank you.
