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just something more to ponder. Whether this passes or fails, especially, of course, if this fails, the avenue is still open to the executive branch to put this into law. The...or not into law, but into a dictate from the executive branch. The nonsmoking areas, the regulation, so far, has been done, I believe, through the executive branch. So there's really no need for this state statute whatsoever, except for the fact that if you believe that the executive branch will not do it and if they would do it or you want to enshrine in state statute to make it harder to turn it back to a dual use facility. So just some things to ponder there. But we're spending a lot of time on this and I'm just curious where the administration stands on this and how come, if it's very...needed to be done, how come they haven't done it already? Just something to ponder, and I won't take up any more time. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Hilgert. The Chair recognizes Senator Connealy.

SENATOR CONNEALY: Thank you, Mr. President. I think we do...do something with this bill. And I wanted to ask Senator Chambers a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, would you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: ...yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CONNEALY: Do you think that this bill accomplishes something?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I do, Senator Connealy, because, if we did as Senator Hilgert suggests that we do, even if these other entities would impose a no-smoking ban, that could change as soon as you have a change in administration, but if it's in the law then, no matter what administration comes or goes, the public knows what the law is, and it is enshrined in statute, so it does do something.
