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SENATOR JENSEN: Well, and I think the language kind of really sets forth the concern there that there might be times when the patient maybe should not have full knowledge. Well, he does have full knowledge, but depending on a condition, and we're talking about mental health conditions, that it...it...if the provider really feels that that information would be harmful, if he received it, then perhaps it could be withheld, harmful because of therapeutic reasons or what is there. And I realize that's...that's certainly something that becomes subjective to the provider of those records, but that's only time it'd be used. And I think we're talking about a very insignificant amount.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, does this apply to cancer payment...patients then in this case?

SENATOR JENSEN: No.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: It's just strictly...

SENATOR JENSEN: No.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...mental health in this case?

SENATOR JENSEN: Primarily in that psychological area.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. Before we proceed, Senators Stuhr, Wehrbein, Cudaback, Hudkins, Vrtiska, Byars, and Price would like to announce the following guests are joining us this morning: 23 high schoolers from Nebraska High Schools Family Consumer Career Leaders of America, and their advisor. (Introduced sponsor.) Would you please rise in the north balcony and be recognized. For discussion on the committee amendments, Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Senator Suttle explained the area that I had difficulty with to my satisfaction, but now I have to go to the subject that Senator Wehrbein brought up. Senator Jensen, first
