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Well, that's preposterous, because all black people are not even the same color. If you were to take all of the members of my family and put them in this room, it would literally range the spectrum from those as pale as you all are, to those who are darker even than I am, and all shades and tints in between. But when I look around this room you all are the ones who all look alike. I could fill up Memorial Stadium with you all, get in a blimp and look down, and all I would see is a sea of pink, or whatever words you all use to describe yourselves, but certainly not white. So you all are the ones who all look alike to those of us who haven't trained our eyes to make those distinctions. So, if we were to take all of these appointments that the Governor has put up here,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I'm leaving out Mr. Wimes, because he was kind of tucked away, like an extra thumb, in the Department of Motor Vehicles, I'm leaving out Director of Corrections Clarke, because he is a rare gem that other governors before this one had seen the value of, I see a whole lot of white maleness, a whole lot of it, and it carried over into our organizational activities. So you all are going to have to just grit your teeth and listen, or excuse yourself from the floor, or tune me out when I feel the need to discuss this subject as I will throughout the session.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And this is the last time I'll speak today on this particular item. I'd like to ask Senator Jensen a question.

SENATOR JENSEN: Yep.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, did each one of these gentlemen appear before the Health and Human Services Committee?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, Senator Chambers, they did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did each give an oral presentation?
