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SENATOR JENSEN: It is clear to me, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you, because I think you're the one who has paid more attention, since you have to carry this through. Members of the Legislature, I really am troubled because we're ending a millennium, we're ending a century, we're starting a new century, starting a new millennium, and people are worried about these computers. That's what they're worried about. That's what I always read in the paper, "Y2K", that's all that I see. But I don't hear and read anybody talking about the need to improve the relationships between and among peoples. And here is something else, my legislative sisters, that I want you to consider with me. White males are deemed to be the superior creatures on this planet. Why do we have a "Y2K" problem? Because white males put together the computers. That is not a problem created by women or black people. So with all their vaunted greatness and all of the almost supernatural powers of these computers, could not they put together a program, or let their computers do it, to deal with the fact that after 1999 you get to the year 2000? Or did they believe that Jesus was going to come back before then and there would be no year 2000? Or did they think that a different type of energy source would be ours and computers would no longer be needed? Or did they think all of us would have mutated to such an extent that in each one of our heads we'd have a little chemical, electrical computer and no longer needs these gadgets. But I look at all that, because a very popular book, not long ago, called The Bell Curve, spent a lot of time demonstrating my and my people's genetic inferiority to white people, and I have never met one of these superior white people in my life. I've gone to nothing but white schools, I didn't meet them there. I went to a white law school, at Creighton, I didn't meet them there. I've been in this Legislature almost 30 years,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you know I haven't met them here. So where are they? And this is what my young people have to put up with. This is printed in books. It shows up in editorials. You all only listen to me every now and then, and I'm not in a position to do harm to a single one of you. But suppose your
