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somewhere and have somebody give you your marching orders. Then when you come out of that closet, then you do what they told you to do in public. And that's all you have to do. Taken care of, signed, sealed and delivered. They say, okay, I'll buy, but can we get it through the Legislature. They say, yeah, you can get it past 48 of them. And then they say, well, we're not bright on the Legislature either. How many are in the Legislature, 2,000? They say, well, no, 49. So this person, they...the commissioners say, well, if we got 48 out of 49 in our pocket, what's the trouble? They say, well, we don't want to tell you what the trouble is, but you go over there and nose around, and sit awhile, and ask people if 48 go for one thing, and the 49th one doesn't, who is the 49th one likely to be if consideration has to be given to that 49th one's opinion? Then they find out. And they say, well, it's not going to be such easy sledding. And do you know why I take this approach? Even if the commissioners over there want to have themselves certified as being too dumb to do their job, they are not going to get me, as a legislator, to vote to do that. I will not do it, and the fact that they would even ask us to do it is to my way of thinking unconscionable. Is Senator Brashear here? I want to find a lawyer who is not involved in this particular issue. Senator Bourne, I would like to ask you a question or two, if I may.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bourne, will you yield to a question.

SENATOR BOURNE: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Bourne, you will have to take my word for that this language is in the bill, "an issue of unusual legal complexity". Now you are a lawyer, what does that term mean with precision, so that it can be the justification for going into a secret meeting?

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, I think that's a fairly subjective term, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You mean you, as a lawyer, would not attempt to enlighten your colleagues here as to what this term means?
