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where your basic local rate would be. If you're a US West customer in Omaha, obviously, that rate is above that figure right now. But if you're a company with that \$17.50, in the best terms I can describe it is that's roughly what those rates are going to have to rise to before you're going to be eligible for some of the Universal Service Fund. So rates, as we've said from the very, very beginning, rates are going to have to increase because of the federal act because you've got to try to come up to cost. The Lifeline and Linkup programs, right now we have both of them. We did not have them. We were one of the last states to get Lifeline and we did that in 1997. That basically goes up to \$5.25 a month in the form of assistance to your basic service. That money comes from a federal pool of money that is assessed against companies. The state can increase that and put more money into that, and the feds will give us another, and I've got it, off the top of my head I don't remember what they are, but, roughly, I think we can go up to \$10.50 of assistance. We've chosen not yet to do that. That is a potential item that we can do, and it depends on how much money we want to raise in the Universal Service Fund. The Public Service Commission has come across with their order to say, in order to have an appropriate amount of money, because we really don't know how much we're going to generate, they entered an order that said we're going to assess a 5 percent fee on your interstate and intrastate, interstate is from state to state, intrastate is within the state, long distance toll charges plus your basic local rate minus the taxes that you pay in some of these subscriber line charges, like the 911 stuff. That 5 percent will be assessed and then put into the Universal Service Fund. That's the reason you all probably got some wild calls here in the last couple of months about that order, because if you're a telemarketer and made a lot of calls outside the state of Nebraska, you were going to be assessed the 5 percent, and the Public Service Commission came back and said, look, we're not going to be an island out here. We're not going to assess it against interstate calls. We're only going to deal with what we can control inside the state of Nebraska, and that...that's the proposed fee or fund that's going to be charged here by the Public Service Commission. And on our time line, they are going to try to by May 1st do what they call size that, in other words begin to look at how much money that is, to begin to see how much money can be distributed because we
