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going to imply that most...a lot of that is probably long-term nursing home care. If we can spend money in this particular area and save that money in long-term confined or nursing home care, that would definitely be a positive, it would be a saving. The dilemma we really have as we expand our spending in this area is that we never know for sure or recognize that we will have a reduction in the other areas. Now, long-term nursing home care has been going up quite rapidly. I've used the numbers many times, I don't have them right in front of me, but since 1990 they've gone from \$97 million, \$217 million right now. If you add another \$43 million on, that makes it even higher. That's over a 20 percent rate just in this biennium to the next biennium. We are doing some things in assisted living. As you well know, the intergovernmental transfer is working. We are having...I think there's 32 applications active for the assisted living facilities where we convert nursing homes to assisted living. We are doing many things. I believe that we will see a slow down in long-term nursing home care demands in terms of money. Any way you cut it, it's lots of money. This is not in the Governor's budget, as I would understand it. It does represent an area that will grow. It is definitely a thing that hopefully would save money down the road, but, once again, it will not be measurable except if we see a slowness in the growth of the use of these funds in terms of long-term nursing home care. But, on the other hand, we have a population that is gradually aging in Nebraska, as Senator Jensen quoted those statistics to you. So this is a difficult one, I want you to recognize that as we move forward, and I'm assuming that this will probably go, at least for the first two votes. But as we face this issue, that perhaps the 11th of May, maybe...and we're going to have to make the priorities we have... By the way, I'll be talking several times this morning on A bills. If you look down, we have lots of A bills coming. Keep in mind where you're going to make some cuts somewhere else because that is definitely what will have to happen come May if you're going to hold the line anywhere near...anywhere near, anywhere near 3 percent. Something else will have to come out of the budget,...
