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different cases, or in every case does the Governor have to approve that gift? Doesn't the Governor have to approve?

SENATOR JANSSEN: I believe that's true. The Governor has to approve that. The Governor and the Legislature would have to...have to approve it, any...but the Building...the Building Renewal, that committee are the only ones that look at the building now and the task force are the ones that are going to have to...have to deal with those buildings after they're...they are given to the state or accepted. So, therefore, it is the feeling of the 309 Task Force, since they will be taking care of these buildings after they become the property of the state, they want to be in on looking at them prior to this happening. It's just another catch...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...where, you know, we don't end up with a piece of junk, you know.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah, I understand what you're saying. I guess I'm troubled by the fact that I suppose in any number or variety of situations the state, or I'm seeing more of it on Appropriations Committee now perhaps, but the state ends up paying for bad decisions made by the executive branch in one area or another, one place or another. But we don't ordinarily...I mean that's...that might key a special investigation or a change in the statutes or something like that, but we don't ordinarily inject ourselves...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...into what might be considered an executive branch function of analyzing these various kinds of things. I'm just...I'm just torn a little bit by the question of whether this is "micromanaging". Is it paying attention to the separation of powers, or is it a necessary thing to be done?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, the administration and the Legislature still has the final say, but this, the 309 Task Force are the people who are going to have to...are going to have to do the repairs and maintain them and I think that they are in a better
