have the opportunity to do so before this bill moves much further. But if I can just make a few observations that this is more than just a parity issue. What...if you choose to go ahead and make them equal pay, in effect what you've done is paved the road then for a unified court system in the state where there would be no county court judges and no district court judges, they would all be trial court judges. Maybe that's a good thing, maybe it's not. But that is a big step. That's one that's been extremely contentious in this state. Just make sure that you understand there's more to this vote than just that. Senator Chambers, you struck me...your discussion was interesting. Now if I get this right, that means that if I get...if I would get stopped by a State Patrolman that is a little older and more experienced and gets more pay, that means it's a better stop than if I get stopped by a State Patrolman who's getting paid less. Is that...if I follow your logic, that's correct? Okay. Well, I thought that was true. And the next time I...I've never gotten...well, I'm not going to say that, 'cause I have.... I've never gotten a ticket, okay. But the next time somebody gets stopped, I suppose, just to question the pay grade to make sure that it's a good stop. Might be an interesting concept. The other word of caution, I think that this is probably an amendment that needs to have some discussion. I would hope that Senator Beutler and Senator Brashear and others who are interested would take the opportunity this morning to see if there isn't something that could be worked out for this amendment. I'm comfortable with bumping them up and making them somewhat closer. But realize that one of the things, and I don't know if it's been said this morning, is that there are some county judges that say, look, we do all this juvenile work, and the separate juvenile courts, they get a higher rate of pay, so we ought to...we do that juvenile work, we ought to get paid. Also realize that with that argument that where there are separate juvenile courts the county judges are not doing juvenile work. And so it works both ways, if you're looking at work level, particularly with juvenile cases. And so at this point in time, unless there is some other discussion, I would yield my time to Senator Beutler. Thank you.
