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Fund. Is this...is this actually going to mean at some point a General Fund appropriation, or exactly how...what is the relationship between the Revolving Fund and other funds available for state operation?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. Am I on? Okay. This, within workmen's comp, like many other agen...many other programs, there is a Revolving Fund. Since we are self-insured, premiums are paid in, quote, by the agencies and then payments...claims are paid out using the Revolving Fund. Yes, it does mean there will be...has been and will be increase in workmen's comp rates to be paid by agencies from the General Fund. We have already faced some of these within the Appropriations Committee and have added them in and it would not be surprising that may...workmen's comp rates may go up again for the agencies. But any way you look at it, it does go back to General Funds originally, where the costs are originally made, and then they become Revolving Funds and, at this point, the revolving funds are what we need authority for to pay out the claims.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, if I could continue with that, I noticed on the...on the fiscal note, there is no General Fund appropriation. So is that...is that accurate? Is that...does that mean that there's no General Fund appropriation right now, that there will eventually be one, or exactly what does that mean?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's...that's true. Actually, there should have been some General Fund hits in the past and we probably wouldn't be in the dilemma that we're in right now, but we are putting additional workmen's comp rate expenses into our next fiscal year and you will see those in detail, if you'd like, when we come up with the budget discussion the next...for the next two years.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, thank you, Senator. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. Senator Wehrbein, could I ask you a couple
