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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, suppose we struck the word "primary" and retained the requirement that they be public buildings?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, Senator, we discussed that. And...and that is an alternative, but in some communities, and I'm talking about fairly small communities now, generally speaking, the main building used for community meetings might be the local bank meeting room that they have...that they furnish to the public. And, you know, maybe there's not a telephone in there, so maybe you couldn't hold the meeting there anyway. But in some communities those kinds of buildings are available, and they would actually be more accommodating to the public than, say, a school building or something like that where there are a lot of stairs. I mean this particular...this whole bill would fall under the Americans for Disabilities, the public notice, the open meetings, all of that kind of thing. So I think that we can rest assured that the public would be accommodated well. If you are insistent...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, here...let me ask you this.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose some language would be inserted to indicate that it would be with...these meetings would be within buildings customarily open to the public, or something to that effect?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That would be fine.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I think that would be probably a good solution, maybe, to your concerns.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.
