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SENATOR BEUTLER: In other words,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...my understanding, Senator, yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And then my only other question was with regard to subsection (d) on page 4, again it appears that the videoconferencing language has been parroted. It says, reasonable arrangements are made to accommodate the public's right to attend, hear and speak. Is it...does that language come from elsewhere in the statutes?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I...I'd like to check on this, Senator Beutler, but I think it...it's reflective of the open meetings language, and which has guidelines, and I think it's ten days notice, but I'm not absolutely certain of that, and I need to check that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Very good, thank you very much.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Um-hum.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thank you, Senator Kristensen.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Mr. Clerk, an amendment on the desk.

CLERK: Senator Chambers would move to amend. (See FA22 on page 592 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I had talked to Senator Cudaback and to Senator Schimek about this amendment. What it would do is strike the word "primary" from the.... When...we have to do this differently, because the committee amendment is striking "primary" and "public". So what I would like to do, Mr. President, is rework that amendment,
