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what you're getting at, but it still doesn't help me with the bill so I don't...I just don't...I don't like the idea at all. (Laugh) Way back, I suppose it's been 25 or 30 years now, when we did change this constitution, we used to nominate in the primaries. The Governor candidates ran against Governor candidates of each party, and the Lieutenant Governor candidates ran against each other, party against party and/or independent, whomever ran. But more than once Dwight Burney was a Republican, he was elected Lieutenant Governor when Frank Morrison was Governor...well, I'll take that back, when Ralph Brooks was Governor, because that's when...when Governor Burney succeeded to be Governor for a few months because Governor Brooks died. After that, some place along...I'm sorry, I don't have all of these terms in my mind, but Frank Marsh was elected Lieutenant Governor when Jim Exon was Governor, so you have a Republican Lieutenant Governor and...and Senator Chambers I think is the one that said, he's correct, that the Lieutenant Governor and the Governor don't always agree on everything. We remember Charlie Thone was done in once by his Lieutenant Governor on a certain banking bill. Right. So, being of the same party doesn't necessarily solve your problems. But having said all that, I think the original point was that we...that you would nominate in the primary and then whomever is nominated runs in tandem with the Governor nominee. I don't see anything wrong with that and I think the last several years the Governors have come along and tried to use the Lieutenant Governor in a way so he's not just someone who goes to funerals and presides over the Legislature. It was copied after the way we vote for President and Vice President, but I...there's something about having the Governor choose the Lieutenant Governor nominee that I just don't like very well. I can't put...I'm like Senator Wickersham. One day he...yesterday or today, he couldn't quite...he said he was uneasy and couldn't quite explain it. Well, that's the way I feel about this. I feel like we're getting to something, to some stage that I don't know what it will do for the system nor for the election process. The other thing, two people came in to testify for this bill, Senator Schrock, and they are people who are...and have been continually and have been for a long time involved in analyzing and looking at the constitution of the state and have a great deep interest in elections. So it just seems to me, none of the parties came in, no one, so I think you shot this bill out of committee too
