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running mate and the person that will help them the most when it comes to election time, and that's simply the way I see this bill. Because I saw a lot of Lieutenant Governor candidates in the primaries promising a lot of things they can't deliver and they may not be even on the same wave length as the Governor candidate. So, Senator Chambers, thank you for the amendment and for the input and I am certainly...I'll certainly be available to listen to any other reasonable proposals you have on this. I feel pretty strong about this. I don't think what we're doing now is harmonious at all, and so I would appreciate your consideration on the amendment and the bill.

**SENATOR WICKERSHAM:** The Chair wishes to announce that Senator Willhoft, a former senator from Central City, is visiting the Legislature. Senator Willhoft is under the north balcony. Senator Willhoft. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to speak to your amendment.

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature and Senator Schimek...

**SENATOR WICKERSHAM:** Oh, Senator Chambers, I might note that there are no other lights and if you wish to make this your close.... No, okay.

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** Not yet. It may turn out to be, but I need to...I may need that opportunity. The language that Senator Schimek read from the constitution has nothing to do with the issue that is being presented by this bill. Senator Crosby touched on the way things were in those days. I was here. One of the reasons it's good to have people hang around a long time is they develop what's called an institutional memory. They are aware of why certain things are in the law or the constitution. As Senator Crosby began to explain, in those olden days, everybody running for Governor would run. Everybody running for Lieutenant Governor would run. Whoever got the most votes for Lieutenant Governor would run in the final, regardless of party, and you could vote for a Governor on whichever side you wanted and a Lieutenant Governor on whichever side you wanted so you would in some instances, as was pointed out, wind up with a Governor of one party, a Lieutenant Governor of another party. What that provision that Senator Schimek read to you dealt with
