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SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Did you...did you say me, Mr. President?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I recognized you, Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, I didn't hear it very good. Sorry.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I'm sorry.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you. I am going, yes, I saw the fiscal note and I do too also think it's very modest, but I also do believe that we have a big area to work on here. I just got a complaint yesterday again on child support. And I'm asking, this is to recommend to us ultimately and then for us to pass final judgment, or do the Supreme Court actually make the final acceptance?

SENATOR CROSBY: Supreme Court would make the final recommendation.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay. So this really, we are determining this, but it will be...actually go to them and they still will have final say-so.

SENATOR CROSBY: That's right. That's right. The Supreme Court looks at the recommendations; does not necessarily have to accept them.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I...the complaint I had is just yesterday someone called me very, very upset because they had been paying child support. Apparently the guidelines have been changed as to whether union dues are part of it and then, of course, then they have less money left after union dues. I don't quite all understand it, except I do understand it as with our cost of living. But these are the kinds of issues that are going to be worked out through this commission. And I hear complaints all the time. If any of you have heard the same amount I have, I'm sure you've heard more, we do need to move forward in this area. But it does look like it's still going to Supreme Court; will not be subject to our oversight, which probably at this
