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I'm perhaps sympathetic. I am sympathetic with the attitude that we've got to buy equipment to stay in business. But to say that if we didn't have this factor in child support that people wouldn't go through bankruptcy just doesn't...doesn't work, because child support isn't dischargeable in bankruptcy. What the courts have, what the bankruptcy court has is you've got...your first obligation isn't to your business. Your first obligation is to your kids. You got to provide so they can eat and survive. They didn't do anything wrong in that divorce. They're the people in the middle. And...and the courts are going to come back and say you need to have, as your first obligation, what portion of the money do you have in your hand to give them. Senator Vrtiska raises a good issue about, well, what happens if there isn't any money? That's when people go back to court and say, I'm sorry, I've had a change in life, my business went under, or...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...I'm earning less money, and the courts will examine that and will reduce child support. So the issue isn't if we have less money. The issue is, do we piecemeal now, begin to put in factors in a child support determination, or do we follow what pattern we've had and that's to give it to the courts? I don't think there's a uniformity problem. I think that there are hundreds, if not thousands, of divorce cases that go through using those guidelines and depreciation is added back. There may be a judge here or there who, if a compelling argument's made, that they will...they will not do that. But I'm sure not aware of very many. I think that's a pretty bedrock principle that the district courts are using out there. Senator Baker, just to end up my time, divorces are in district court. Good old Senator Beutler, the other year, allowed the county court, in certain circumstances, to have concurrent jurisdiction but, as a practical matter,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...what, Senator Beutler, 90 percent are sitting in the district court today.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Jones, you are next.
