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SENATOR COORDSEN: ...I will say in the event of a divorce...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...doesn't the court measure up all of the assets of both of the parties to make a...some sort of division of...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Property.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...of the assets that...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...might...? Okay.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, some of the comments that you had made earlier with respect to taking \$30,000 and building a building would seem to be not available to a person. And then the other thing, and it's something that is always of interest to me, if you were an attorney, for an example, and you put all of your spare money into the stock market and you put it all into Internet trading stocks and the value of those went up tremendously, you would not have that increase in capital value included in the determination of child support, would you? Well, you couldn't get to it unless you sold the...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Right.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...sold the investment. So that,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: You'd have to sell it.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...so, as an attorney, that would be excluded for you, would it not?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: No...

SENATOR COORDSEN: The value of the stock at some point in time
