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consider that situation, or the commission, whatever mechanism is there in place to look at these things. That would give Senator Baker a full shot at having the commission consider the specific problem. It would give the commission the opportunity to address it head-on, to look at the nuances and the problems with the language that Senator Baker has, himself, recognized. And then, if we're still not satisfied with what they do, then we can come in here and beat them over the head and say you are going to do it this way on this particular rule. I'd just ask Senator Baker and the others to think about that. I think it would be a way of bringing the problem to the attention of the folks who should be making the decision and affording them a full and clear opportunity to make that decision one way or another. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Kristensen, you are next.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. I don't see Senator Coordsen here. There he is. You know, don't...don't ever let Senator Coordsen ever pull your leg that he's just a poor old country farmer. Well, maybe he's poor, I don't know (laugh), but...but, you know, you just saw him do a pretty good job of cross-examine where you don't let the...you put your points out in good form and that's a good lesson for people to learn. And I didn't have my light on, but I wanted to put my light on and tell you that it's not an issue of whether the courts make mistakes, because courts are human. They're made up of individuals who we select and we have a process for selection. We pay them money to go make tough decisions. They're not immune from making mistakes at all. But what they aren't immune...or what they are immune from is that if we give them a policy, we shouldn't criticize them for the policy that we set. And we've given them a policy. We've said, Supreme Court, you go out and set up those child support guidelines because we don't want to do it, and because the guidelines that we disagree with, the conclusion that we asked them to come up with, we're now going to, at a piece at a time, to do it. And that's where...that's where I have to philosophically stand up and say, look, we either do it inside this body or let them do it, but the mix and match will never work. Judges make mistakes all the time. But this...this
