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mechanism, and this is my last time and I don't plan to speak again on it and...and the body will certainly do as it sees fit and I'll certainly live with that, but Senator Beutler's suggestion, obviously, poses us some mechanical problems, as how do you let the court know this? How do they go about and make that consideration? Now if Senator Crosby's bill goes through, there probably is a form and a mechanism for doing that. But this has been debated on many occasions. When the child support guidelines were first set up, this was an issue that was hotly talked about and debated. There's been a subsequent...well, two subsequent meetings and investigations and revisions, one major revision of child support guidelines where, again, this was the major issue. They didn't come down on that side. And so I...I'm not going to vote for this, obviously, as you can tell. Certainly, this is an issue that I think you're asking and heading us down a slope that we're not going to be able to retreat from and we'll probably be back in every year making some tinker, some change, and we either ought to do it ourselves or give it to the courts, and I think Senator Matzke correctly pointed out it's a much...it's too much of a mechanical, technical, day-to-day thing for this Legislature. We deal with policy. We don't deal well with management, and we're much better policymakers, and I just think we ought to keep the current policy and let the courts do it, and if we don't like it, then we have a mechanism that Senator Crosby has. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Yours was the last light on so, Senator Baker, it is up for (microphone deactivated).

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Madam Chairman. First off, I'm not suggesting we "micromanage" the way the courts have handled child support. This is that we are working with this, obviously, the way we've done it, but it's a basic fairness issue and a question we have to ask ourselves is, when you go out and buy a business asset designed to help you make money in that business, is it a legitimate expense? That's the bottom line. The courts have said no, and I believe it is. And we have to rectify the problem that there's no consistency in their process right now. They have this ability and they're saying, no, we do not recognize purchase of a capital asset as a
