There will be a handout showing the estimated numbers that different levels will do. And once again I emphasize this is an estimate as to the impact, but I believe that most agree that this is probably the most useful way to approach it.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Debate on the amendment? Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature. Yes, Senator Wehrbein, thank you for bringing the amendment. My understanding that this is a compromise that's been reached with the National Guard, and that actually, you know, we would like to have seen 100 percent. And, if you get right down to it, maybe we can work that out in the next few years to get more. This way we'll be adding about 100 more people to the...to the educational opportunities...the National Guard. And, if that happens, and if we're able to...able to raise those recruits, why then it may demonstrate to this body and to the administration what can happen when you lead the...lead the horse to water, let's say. But, no, thank you, Senator Wehrbein. And I believe everyone is quite comfortable with...with...with the situation right now. And hope you find it favorable vote on the amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I just wanted to let everyone know that...that the money that we have had in for the tuition assistance has not been used up. I think maybe it was mentioned the last time, but we have not been using the full amount. And so it would seem that...that for us to start a little bit slower and to cap the amount makes a lot of sense, at least from the perspective of the Appropriations Committee and being able to manage the cost. And then we can really look at whether this, moving from 50 to 75 percent, does make a difference in their ability to recruit, because there...to me there still is a question about whether this will make a significant difference in the economy, the way it is. But, but I'm willing to go along with the Wehrbein proposal. And certainly, as long as we have some way to manage it, manage the cost of it, I think that this is a much better situation than what we were faced with on General File. Thank you.
