SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Preister, if I'm reading your amendment right, now there are exceptions to this, which would be the Nebraska veterans home, private residences, residential halls and dormitories under the control of the Board of Regents, University of Nebraska. Is that right?

SENATOR PREISTER: That's correct.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Those are exemptions. So, then the...that would mean the dormitories on the campus would...would be exempt, people could still smoke there.

SENATOR PREISTER: Currently, the university has designated, as I understand it, a smoking dormitory. And this would allow for that one; it wouldn't expand it so they could smoke anywhere in any of the dormitories. It would still be under the university's rules and their policies.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-huh.

SENATOR PREISTER: But it wouldn't totally ban it, even in that one where they're currently allowing it.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-huh. I...I...I have no...I don't have a problem with anyone smoking anywhere they would want to, except for the young people. As I've stated before, and you've heard me say on this floor, I think, the place that most young people learn to smoke is at a college or university. And I would like...I would like to see those stricken from this bill, too. So if...if...I would suggest that...that the university, all the dormitories be smoke-free. And then I could support your...then I could support your amendment, if that was the case. I have no problem with the veterans home whatsoever. These people are probably in their eighties. I don't think that's going to hurt them now. It's the young people that I am concerned with, more than anything else. So, with that, unless it's changed, why I cannot support your amendment. Thank you.
