you could be ticketed if you don't wear that belt. A few years back, I wasn't here when it was passed, but the seat belt was passed in the mandatory fashion. I didn't support it back then. I still don't support it. The people then voted and voted it back out. The Legislature came back, put it back in, made it mandatory and I have observed out there many times senators that were in this body at the time when that was passed and supported the mandatory seat belt, when they're driving their vehicle or when they're riding in a vehicle, they're not wearing it. I do not support the mandatory seat belt. I think that people, when they're adults, should be able to choose what they do, but I wear mine almost all the time. I've got a bad habit, everybody laughs at me. I go to the lake, I go to back my boat in the water, I get out, I get it ready to go, and when I go to back down the ramp, I hook my seat belt, but, anyway, I do support everybody wearing it, so we got that clear, but I also understand where Senator Chambers is coming from. I don't live in Senator Chambers' District. I have been there. I think he has a different situation where he is at than most of us do. I have a picture in my office that I look at almost every morning when I go in there, and it is a picture of a Native American warrior or chief, I presume a warrior, but the caption under that is "O Great Spirit, grant that I might not criticize my neighbor until I have walked a mile in his moccasins." And I look at that, and although I probably don't do this all the time, I try to live by that, and I think we need to take a look at that and I think this is an issue that needs to be looked at in that respect because of what can happen out there. And, again, I'm not saying that every police officer out there is going to stop you...
