Because most of the influential people are the ones driving down the road with a cell phone. I believe it was the state of Connecticut, and don't quote me on this, but one of the eastern states done a survey and a large percent of their accidents were caused by people driving while talking on cell phones. So sometimes we deal with issues, what is causing the accident is not really the problem. It may be something else. We had bills in here to put safety ed back within the State Patrol a couple of years ago. It was denied. We have taken the driver's education away from our public schools because we don't fund it. I believe education is the way to go with these seat belts. You start out with children when they are born and you put them in those car seats, and they are fastened in those car seats until age 4. Most of them won't ride in a vehicle unless they got their seat belt fastened because they have been accustomed to using it. It's habit, and I think that's one thing that we need to do, and I think we need to look at parents' responsibility. We're talking about teenagers, young people, not wearing their seat belts and being killed in accidents out here. Why aren't parents teaching these young people to wear their seat belts? I think there's a lot of factors built into this and, believe me, I respect law enforcement probably as much as anybody. I didn't serve 30 years with the department for nothing, but, believe me, there are people out there that will use this, I'm not talking about probable cause to go to court, but they may use this just for a reason to stop somebody for whatever if they cannot observe the seat belt being worn. The truckers came in and supported this bill. Truckers, I believe now is a primary offense if you're not wearing it. But I ask you, if you're driving down the car...the road in your car, how can you look up and tell whether a trucker is wearing his seat belt or not. It's impossible. And so these are the things, I think, that need to be addressed and I think need to be thought about. And, again, I respect Senator Byars 100 percent in what he is trying to do as far as saving people's lives out here, but I think education and there's other ways to go about this,...
