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I'll share with you if you want to see them about how happy they are that I'm on the Ag Committee and will puncture these stuffed shirts by asking the kind of questions that need to be asked. I was at a meeting with some members of the Ag Committee, and some of the big shots from the big packing firms yesterday; Cargill, Farmland, ConAgra, IBP. You know who the grilling person was? Me. But why in the world should I expend all that energy because white producers are going to be put out of business, because white farmers are going to lose the family farm, when their representatives will stand on this floor and say, well, yeah, the cops might stop your people, they might kill some...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...of them. That's just a part of the game. Well, I wonder how far these kind of efforts will go in the Ag Committee if I would withdraw all of my participation and say, let us each take care of our own. I didn't tell these people to become producers. I didn't tell them to become farmers. And if the big packers take over, the consumers will have lower prices because you have the economies and efficiencies of scale. My colleagues on the Ag Committee don't want me to take that position. And those people out there who are being oppressed, as they feel, by the packers don't want me to take that position. But when things happen on this floor as they're unfolding now, I have to do some reevaluating and establish my priorities because I am going to have to have more energy to fight a solitary battle for the interest of the people that I am sworn to represent.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. The Chair recognizes Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. President, members, again, I think this is the third time I have spoken on this but one thing I wanted to bring out, I think one of the testifiers in the committee spoke about, I think it was a police officer, and he spoke about getting tired of seeing little children standing up in the seats when he met them on the road or whatever. I think if he sees little children standing up on the seat of a vehicle, he can stop them and give the people a ticket now because that is a child restraint and it comes under a different statute than
