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this. But I am not going to talk on this any more. I am going to yield my time to Senator Chambers, and let him continue to address that, and see what happens. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. The Chair recognizes Senator Byars. I am sorry, Senator. Did he yield? Well, Senator, you're recognized.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: You have four minutes left.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...members of the Legislature, I know this matter is not too important in the minds of my colleagues, but there are going to be other issues on this floor, other issues which I've done yeoman work on in helping various senators, and I see the way you're doing on this one, and I learn. I am a fast study. I will have a lot more time if I leave these rural problems alone. There are far more rural senators here than there are black senators. Let them take care of their own. Let them study these issues, these contract issues, these pricing information issues, and argue on their own. And when these rural people call me, I'm going to tell them that my work is too hard trying to represent those who sent me here and I don't have time to be spreading myself this thin. There are members on this floor who sat in the Judiciary Committee and heard the exchange that I'm going to share with you all later on between me and the cop and the cell phone of the black man who was killed that wound up in the cruiser of the two cops who killed him, and they didn't know how it got there. And that doesn't even trouble white people. It didn't ruffle anybody. But you know what I shared with them? A case where a young white kid was going to be charged with felony murder by the Douglas County Attorney in the death of a fireman, and I didn't know him, I didn't know their family, but I saw an injustice so I researched the law and I put together a memorandum demonstrating that he could not, under the law, be charged with felony murder. And when he went for a preliminary hearing, you know what the judge said? He cannot be charged with felony murder. And the arguments that I had put together and distributed in my memorandum were the basis of that decision. I reach out when I see white people or anybody else hurting. People on this floor
