SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, Section 4 is a repealer clause and it repeals the provision in law that makes a traffic...a seat belt violation a secondary offense. This bill does several things. It would convert this violation into a primary offense by repealing the section of Statute 60-6,271, and that is the subject of my motion, to strike that repealer and let this continue to be a secondary offense.
