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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm going...thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I'm going to read from this transcript Captain David Friend's guess about that telephone. "DAVID FRIEND: It's my guess that somebody happened to go by there, don't know who that somebody would be, would have to have been one of the first responders or an investigator, either an Omaha police or an Omaha fire person, found it there, didn't realize any significance, did not log it into property, figured it belonged to one of the people that was there and tossed it inside the car, and, again, that's just a guess." He acknowledged it was just a guess, but the grand jury investigation established that no police officer on the scene saw the cell phone, no fire person on the scene saw the cell phone. So we wind up with the same question. Later on, a representative from the Sarpy County Sheriff's Office testified. His last name was Grabowski, and we had been talking about preserving a crime scene, protecting evidence and so forth, and I had asked him a question about this telephone and the question established, as a result of his answer, that any object at the scene is a part of the crime scene; that to move that object is to disturb the crime scene. And I asked him would he have touched any object in this manner, picked it up and put it inside the cruiser? He said, certainly not, and no experienced investigator or officer would do that. But even if somebody had done it, the cop sitting in the cruiser would have to have seen it. Now Senator Byars is not interested in this, because a cop is not going to kill anybody in Beatrice. I think, Senator Byars, you're from Beatrice, aren't you? You can just nod. Yes, he is. There are other matters that I intend, no matter how long it takes, to get into the record while we're discussing this bill and I will be able to use that transcript to show what was presented on the floor of this Legislature, the unresponsiveness of my colleagues to these issues. Then, when "Deacon" Jones comes before the Ag Committee, I'll have something for him next time other than what he got this time. Oh, the "Deacon" was there, and the "Deacon" was whining, and the "Deacon" was crying. And why was the "Deacon" whining and crying? Later on in the discussion I will be able to share with you some of the reasons that he had. But he was not the only one. He was not singing or whining a solo. It was more like a
