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we're going to repeat all of these discussions again and again and again, and not only on this bill but on other bills too. And I think it was Senator Schmitt who cited the comment about walking a mile in somebody's moccasins. Well, when one of these bills that Senator Byars is so concerned about and he says it affects the interests of people that he thinks so much of, I'm going to give him a chance to wear some other moccasins than the ones he wears now. He has to realize he's back in the Legislature and if he throws a stone he has to expect something to come back to him. And it may be necessary, since he's floating, for me to return him to earth, and that's what I intend to do. But I would like to ask Senator Byars a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Byars, would you yield?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, I will, Mr. President.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, are you aware of other things that cause deaths to people in this society?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, I am.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are there numerous children who get hold of toxic substances in the home and are poisoned thereby?

SENATOR BYARS: I...yes. I don't have statistics relative to that, Senator Chambers, but I think anecdotally at least that would be the case.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you concerned about the welfare of children?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you be willing to make it a crime for any parent to leave a toxic substance where a child can gain access to it? You got your instructions. Go ahead and digest them and then answer my question, if you will.

SENATOR BYARS: I'm not even sure what Senator Brown said, but...
