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faxed it to you. Is that correct?

SENATOR BYARS: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, that's what I want to make clear in the record, not that you would have to confirm the validity of the letter but just that what you handed out to us is all that this outfit sent to you. Okay, that having been...

SENATOR BYARS: It's not the only thing that they sent to me, but it is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, as far as this letter.

SENATOR BYARS: ...one of the things, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: On this letter. This letter was signed purportedly by Milton J. Little, Jr., Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of the National Urban League, and here is something that Senator Byars did not read: Throughout all of our discussions about the campaign, my colleagues in the Urban League movement have expressed grave concern that stricter enforcement of seat belt laws would put African Americans and others at greater risk of illegal or unwarranted...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...stops, searches and seizures by law enforcement officials. For instance, the head of the Indianapolis Urban League and many other concerned citizens in that state worried that a proposed Indiana law lacked adequate protections. Our movement is wary that state legislators elsewhere would draft similarly vague legislation. So my colleagues implored us to proceed very cautiously in this area. We discussed these concerns and our strategy with David Kelly of Ms. Dewey's staff. I think that's about all I can get done on this time speaking.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator. Chair recognizes Senator Tyson. Before I do so, members, out of respect to your colleagues, if you could either lower your conversations or take them off the floor, a colloquy between the two of them could
