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have done that in the last week? There's opportunity for law enforcement officials to stop you if they want to stop you. Failure to signal a turn. Have you ever done that? Certainly not. I know Senator Chambers never has. Overloading front seat or obstructing the driver or obscuring the driver's view; opening a door so as to obstruct traffic in a moving vehicle; driving at any speed unsafe for the conditions of the road, regardless of the speed limit. What's too safe for conditions? Did every one of you know that the speed limit you were driving on Monday of this week, or Tuesday, whenever we had the snowstorm, was that absolutely safe for the conditions of the road? If the law enforcement officer wanted, they might have pulled you over and questioned that. Could they not have? Improperly adjusted headlights; glare from headlights. You happen to pull up behind a patrol car, and you're in a 4 by 4, a sport utility vehicle or a pickup truck, you sit a little higher, you might have your lights on dim but they seem very bright. Does that give the law enforcement officer an option to turn on his lights and stop you? Certainly. Lack of brake lights or turn signal lights, that happens to all of us, doesn't it? White lights to the rear; red lights on the front of the motor vehicle; cleated tires, ones with any clocks, stud, flanges, cleat, or a spike or any other protuberance, that's good, of any material other than rubber. And you say, well, they can't see that. That's right but they might stop you and say, do you have cleated tires, and use that as a means of harassment. Worn tires, any of you have tires that you've been saying that you're going to replace and you haven't, maybe because you can't afford it? I see the Pages looking at me right now. They've all got worn tires. Improper or overly dark windshield and window tinting; vehicle without a muffler or creating excessive or unusual noise; vehicle creating excessive fumes or smoke;...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BYARS: ...a vehicle equipped with a television screen visible to the driver. Look at these, folks. The only argument that Senator Chambers has against this bill is that it's going to allow law enforcement officials another opportunity to stop you and harass you. It's the only, the only argument that he's had against this bill. And I tell you that it is not valid. It
