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Cham...how much time do I have, Mr. President?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: About two minutes.

SENATOR BROMM: Would Senator Chambers yield to a question, please?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, the primary objections I've heard in this debate to this bill are, number one, the arguments that you make about increased harassment of a class of people and a race of people, and the second objection, primary objection I've heard, is that it is another mandate. Does that summarize the objections that...in your...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Plus...plus I mentioned the fact this morning that I got a call from a woman who gets panic attacks and every time she's stopped she has to show the medical statement.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, well, right, but aren't those two arguments the primary ones that have been made?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I believe that would be correct.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Chambers, if we were able to take away the probability of increased harassment as a result of stopping someone for not having a seat belt on, would you have less objection to the bill?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you can make water run uphill or suspend the earth from a rope of sand, then I'll give the answer yes to your question. But I want to hear how you propose to do that before I answer that question.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, well, that is...that is a fair...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...that is a fair response. But let me say this; that I think that there is a possibility that we can develop something that would be of at least interest to Senator
