

TRANSCRIPT PREPARED BY THE CLERK OF THE LEGISLATURE
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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Members of the Legislature, Senator Byars, obviously, is not listening, and, Senator Byars, you're not alone in that, but you should pay closer attention since you're one of the proponents of this bill, and the reason I say one of them, Senator Bromm is in it as deeply as you are, and I want him to be aware that I've taken very, very strong note of that, Senator Bromm, because he and I had a conversation the other day. I said that in the beginning, and I'm emphasizing it now so that because of your deficiency in listening, people will not attribute to me a deficiency in expressing myself on the issue. I discussed that lady's situation several times and even said I wish I had thought to find out which senator represents her so I could have told her call that senator, tell that senator what you told me, because they may believe that senator whereas they don't believe me. Maybe the reason my colleagues don't believe me is that they either don't pay attention or they don't understand what I say. So I'm going to strive a little harder to speak English a little more clearly, so that people will understand what I'm saying. And I want my colleagues to start paying attention to them there things which I may say from time to time. And I'm going to try to do a lot better in expressing myself than I has done in the past.
