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SENATOR SCHMITT: Senator Tyson just mentioned.

SENATOR LYNCH: Thirteen thousand. I have no idea.

SENATOR SCHMITT: I guess the big question I have here, and I'm going back to maybe Senator Chambers' thought process with police departments, I'm going back to thought process with labor unions. If this passes, would this allow nonunion members to work without being harassed by the union members if they have a strike?

SENATOR LYNCH: Gee, I don't know.

SENATOR SCHMITT: It's a big...that's a big question I guess of me.

SENATOR LYNCH: I tell you, I've known union members to harass other union members. (Laugh)

SENATOR SCHMITT: Nonunion.

SENATOR LYNCH: I've known...well, I know.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Nonunion.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yeah, but I mean if we're going to say something like that, Senator Schmitt,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...you're trying to write into law something that would prevent somebody from saying something nasty to somebody else, and would it apply in reverse? If a nonunion member of a company would say something snotty or nasty to a union member, would the same kind of principle apply?

SENATOR SCHMITT: Well, that went beyond conversation, but we'll leave it go at that for now. (Laugh) Thank you.
