SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...only recourse is to go to court to seek payment. I doubt somebody would quit to avoid paying \$10 or even \$100. I don't know of anybody, any union, that ever spent thousands and thousands of dollars representing their point of view. Number 12, most business decisions on whether to locate or expand have nothing to do at all with whether the state provides a fair share fee for nonunion employees. And, lastly, LB 27 would have no effect on whether or not employees go on strike. I don't know how you deal with an issue like this. You all got kids, some of you have kids, some more than others. You know, it's like you go to the store, you're out of town and you want to buy something for the family. You got five girls. You can't buy one a nice little necklace that some Indians put together as a example of their fine artwork without buying one for all of them.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.
