I filed this amendment and so you'll know what it does in a nutshell, it takes out Section 12, the part in Section 12 that exempted this from the NITC, the Nebraska Information Technology Commission. As you recall last year on LB 924, we created the Nebraska Information Technology Commission in order to oversee all the information technology issues that we have across the state of Nebraska. Senator Maurstad, as Lieutenant...Senator, Lieutenant Governor Maurstad has just been appointed Chairman of that commission, if you recall, and previously it was Lieutenant Governor Kim Robak. I'm going to read from (sic) you the law that we passed last year so you know who is on this commission. It's one member representing elementary and secondary education, one member representing postsecondary education, the Governor or his or her designee, one member representing communities, five members representing the general public who have experience in developing strategic plans and making high-level business decisions. I have the list of the people that are on this, if you're interested in that or, if you want to get more into the debate, I certainly will. But it are...it is people from across the state. It is people involved in detail and in depth with information technology. President of the University of Nebraska is on it. Senator Bob Kerrey is on it. And I want to say I started out being not so sure whether this should be, but I wanted to file the amendment so it had a thorough discussion. I probably am not absolute that this shouldn't happen, that it should be exempt, but I have come to believe that it really should be falling under this commission to look this over. If you look at Senator Tyson's list of people that he has, they are nearly all users, except for the Division of Communication under DAS. The rest are nearly all users, if not all--firemen, law enforcement and so forth, and so forth, and so forth. But there still is not a broad, broad perspective from across the state and from other occupations, if you will, or information technology specialists, if you will. And I've come to believe that it would be important for them to stay under this Nebraska Information Technology Commission and get their approval. That is the gist of this amendment, is to be sure that they are reviewed by the Nebraska Information Technology Commission. Some may say that this is another layer of government. Perhaps it's another bureaucracy we created. But if you remember the problems we've had in the last few years of the...in the explosion of information technology and the rather broad use of
