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here in Nebraska and see changes that need to occur. But it is possible that because people have always held a favored position, they are accustomed to believing that the way things are is the way things should be. It becomes necessary for somebody from the outside to say, wait a minute, a change is in order, a change can be made, and we, as a Legislature, which you can say, in a sense, is more representative of the body politics than any of the other branches of government, must set that tone and be what I've come to call that civilizing agent. By the things we do, we must set the tone. By the things we do, we must put ourselves in a position to advise and counsel young people on morals, values, acceptable and desirable behavior and conduct. But when all we do is speak those words and what we embody in those words is not reflected in our conduct, then as Shakespeare said, full of sound and fury, signifying nothing. For those of you who are religious, go to what Paul, the Imposter, put in 1 Corinthians 13:13, as a sounding brass and a tinkling cymbal. That's all it is, a lot of noise, chaos, confusion, but nothing of substance. Brothers and sisters, I want us to begin to take note of what is happening. We don't control the Governor but we can have an affect...we can have an effect on what the Governor does, and our actions can affect the kinds of nominations and appointments he sends to us. I'm going to vote no on these nominations because I think they are reflective of a chauvinistic discriminatory unacceptable attitude. The entire pool of female talent is dismissed as being unworthy of consideration. I think that is atrocious. I think it is wrong, and it is especially reprehensible when it is done by a Governor who did so much boasting...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.
