people who qualify for Lifeline from paying the surcharge to the Universal Service Fund. We don't know exactly what that surcharge will be, but it's been established by the order that was entered recently by the PSC to be 5 percent of the long distance charges, 5 percent of long distance charges. That...that could change to a different percentage, but that's what it...what it is proposed to be right now. That's a credible suggestion, but I don't know how much long distance those folks use as a rule. By being on Lifeline, they get...they get the benefit of at least two things--their phone bill is reduced by about five and a quarter per month, and they can't be disconnected from their phone for nonpayment of their bill. To qualify for Lifeline the requirements are very...are very straightforward and very strict, and they're established by federal law because there's federal money available to help with the Lifeline Program. And I don't have the...I do have the guidelines somewhere but I don't have them in front of me as I speak, but such things as if you're on food stamps or qualifying for a public assistance program of some kind, those are the kinds of guidelines that they draw from other...from other standards to determine who qualifies for the Lifeline Program. I have, since Senator Chambers has filed the amendment, I've talked to the Public Service Commission and Senator Chambers and I spoke this morning, and I had a suggestion and it was this; that I would be willing to propose an amendment which would use the maximum amount of money possible to leverage the Lifeline Program. The federal government will give us a dollar to help with the Lifeline Program for every two dollars that we put into the program. I have not filed the amendment because, to some extent, I think this is an issue that we need to discuss Senator Chambers' issue first, but I want you to know what I think is a better alternative. My amendment would suggest that or would tell the Public Service Commission, you are to maximize your use of the Lifeline monies that are available from the federal government and you are to credit into the pot, in order to access those federal monies, any service charges that are paid by the Lifeline folks. So, if there are Lifeline people who do use long distance, the surcharge they pay, the 5 percent, will be put into the Lifeline Fund, which would bring a dollar of federal funds in for every two dollars of those monies. My amendment does one other thing. It says if that money isn't enough, you're to take such additional money out...
