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3 million, 2 million, 1 million. The 50th one on the list raised \$1.3 million for his, it is a his, House race. I don't think that's exceptional to have those House races costing up to a million dollars. They are very expensive, and it takes a lot of energy and work to raise a million dollars, and my...my read on this is that there is so much time and energy going into raising money and to campaigning back in the district that these House members don't really have time to be reflective, to be on top of some of the issues, and unless they're an incumbent that has a pretty safe seat, and then...and we all know there are those, there are those officials. The one thing you should keep in mind, that no matter what we do with this resolution this morning, it will only petition Congress, and it will not force them to do one single solitary thing. There have been numerous resolutions in the House over the years I have discovered as I've worked in this issue, and in recent years, they have generally been tied to term limits, which has doomed them to failure from their outset. In addition, there is that argument about the Senate and whether these House members then would be free in their off year to run against an incumbent senator or run for a Senate seat, and those are things that we should consider, but I do believe that, first of all, it's going to be very expensive to run for a Senate seat as well. So I don't think you're going to see too many of them running, unless it happens to be an open seat. But in addition to that, I believe, and I may be wrong, but I believe that you could have statutory language saying that if you wanted to run for that Senate seat, you would have to resign your House seat, and you could perhaps take care of that problem. There are a variety of ways that you could approach this. This has been something that has been a bipartisan idea, and if you look at those House resolutions, they've been introduced by a variety of people including, and you have a letter in your file folder, again, from Congressman Bereuter, from the First District, here in Nebraska, who has been a cosponsor of some of these resolutions. I think Congressman Barrett has as well. And they both sent me letters basically supporting the idea.
