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know how many of the rest of you are card-carrying, dues-paying members of NOW, I am. I don't know how many of the rest of you are, but here's a comment that was made in 1982 on a health insurance-related issue. This representative of what I think is a leading women's group said: With regard to the insurance issues, specifically, we do feel that benefits are best left determined by employees. When a person does accept employment, health insurance is one of their benefits, the total package they accept. Their benefits should not be subject to the whims of an outside group. I like that quote. It happened to be in defense of a bill I voted for, and that time there was a bill to make sure that the state employees could not get abortion coverage, and we were going to write the...essentially the state employees coverage by saying we couldn't have coverage for abortion. Well, at that point, the women's groups came in and said, wait a second, the health insurance policy of employees should be their choice, not the choice of the Legislature to set by law. They were right that day. Unfortunately, we got outvoted, and the bill passed. But NOW was right that day, and I voted with them that day, and it is exactly that theory which is present in this issue, and that is whether or not people get to decide for themselves or whether the state gets to decide for them. First, the marketplace offers lots of options that have contraception coverage. I've just listed them to you. Secondly, there are women on both sides. I've certainly received a petition with many names on it in favor of the bill, but as far as contacts are concerned, I've had 9 letters for the bill and 32 letters from women against the bill. Now I've gotten more letters than that from men and from groups, but I've discounted those. There are women on both sides of this issue. There is not like one gender point of view, because there are...there is a multiplicity of points of view with respect to these issues. And by the way, who's to say whose freedom of choice we have to anoint, those who want to use the power of the state to require the model contract, or those women who are writing me saying, please do not force a contract on us with terms we do not want. In the end, if it's in the marketplace, if it's available, and it is, coverage for contraception, if there isn't a widespread pattern of discrimination, and there isn't with respect to Viagra, I think the employee or the group should decide for themselves. Now what about people that are trapped into group policies and they don't have
