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morning on the basis that men are my enemy. I have three sons. They bring a dimension to my life that I would be sorry that I didn't have, if I didn't have them. The same way with my daughter, she brings another dimension. I have two bro...I had two brothers, one dead. I have a living brother and they brought to me a dimension, and my brother is still there for me, and helps me when I need help.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: I am not angry at any of the men here in the Legislature, and, Senator Chambers, I am not angry with you. I try never to get angry. I do get angry about bills and issues, but I go out the door and try to say that's past now, we go on, and we work together. So I guess that's what I am coming down to, I just can't vote for this, this morning, just because seven men voted against it. I hope that we will look at that objectively from the point of view of both sides. And I haven't had, I will have to tell you, I haven't had much mail or phone calls. I have had some and most of them are for it. But I think people on the other side in my district probably take me for granted. So, Senator Suttle, I'll say again, I hope eventually maybe we can all...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time

SENATOR CROSBY: ...study it. I think women should look at all those things that I talked about. And take heart, it took me three, at least three sessions to get that bill out of that committee. Right, Senator Landis?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR CROSBY: You are such a hardheaded person. (Laugh.)

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Bohlke.
