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here in the Legislature treat any issue any differently because they happen to be male or they happen to be female. I can't speak about the insurance industry, but I remember other debates and issues on this floor and I believe that people approach those issues as state senators. And I don't have all the information the Banking Committee had in dealing with this issue, but I am not convinced that if it would have been four women on the Banking Committee the result would have been any different. And so I think we're missing the point of the argument when we slant it in that direction. What I do think is that what I have heard, and I will give Senator Landis, I see he has his light on, he can respond to this, is that generally I've heard that the Banking Committee lets one mandate out a year. And if that's the truth, they let one out this year on Senator Schimek's bill. Now you can tell me if that's how you...you work a long time, you get a number of bills before you with a number of mandates, and I know you work with the representatives of the insurance companies. Now that may not be true, but that's what I've heard, and in looking at the history of what has come out of committee and how long it takes to get out of committee, it seems to me that we get about one bill out a year dealing with a mandate. The other part that I would like to speak to is that for my colleagues who are new here, when I came to the Legislature, I made a decision on pulling bills from committee, and my decision was that as I looked at the organization of the Legislature, I thought the committee system, the committees really are our second house, and so as I watched it after my first year, I have had a long-standing position that I do not vote to pull something out of committee. I think that I appreciate the Speaker timed this so we aren't taking what would be a longer time, but I know there are a number of other issues out there right now that people are looking at to pull out of committee. And I always have great concern when that happens, because as we get on down into the session, later in the session, we have priority bills and things that are very important to people, and you get those that have not been successful in committee, and I think that certainly disrupts the agenda, the time spent on the floor on the things that are important to others who have gotten those measures out of committee. So I do not vote to pull something out of committee, but if...if this were successful, I've been listening carefully, I think I would support, though, and vote for the measure. It's
