more than you get. So any change in the system is what they dislike, and they want you to stay right where you are. I'm going to tell you something that disappointed me. I can't be in two places at once. The legislative...the Legislature's Executive Board did not give our employees the two days off that we usually give them for Easter. So what these employees around here are going to stop doing is taking me for granted. There are a lot of benefits they get because of me and what I'm willing to push for because I believe in fairness, despite the way that I get treated around here, despite the way sometimes my staff member gets treated around here. I try to do what's fair, and when I'm not there, what happened? You lose 50 percent of what you would have gotten in terms of time off for Easter. That's what happens around here when I don't take a position, and who will fill the gap is like asking the question, who will bell the cat? Nobody.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time. Senator Suttle.

SENATOR SUTTLE: Thank you, Mr. President. I yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Suttle. Mr. Speaker, and members of the Legislature, as Senator Kiel had indicated when she was speaking, the language in this bill tracks what insurance companies currently do for other prescription and out-patient services. It is not going to break these insurance companies. And I'm going to emphasize again that we, in the Legislature, set the tone as to how things should be. We should be the teachers. We should be the mentors, and we should operate at a higher level than those who make the decisions that they make based on profit alone. We're supposed to be above that, but the Legislature, as a whole, often is not. It must be goaded, it must be driven, because left to itself it becomes the tool of every powerful special interest group to the detriment of the citizens as a whole. When I talk to these student groups, and I got an invitation from somebody out in Millard to do it when they come down here again, it's...it's difficult for me to agree to do that. Why don't they ask these other senators who are setting the moral tone for this state, ask to speak.
