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have an obligation to correct those long-standing evils that are still with us. We cannot avoid them by saying, well, somebody's granddaddy did or a graat granddaddy but I had no direct role to play. Well, we've been given the opportunity now and we have to make that decision and we have to place an action. And if the action goes right in line with the wrongful things that exist today, we are guilty, more guilty, in fact, than the ones who put it there originally because we've seen the damage that it does, and we still will not raise the hand to stop it.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, I am going to ask for a call of the house, and I realize that my time will be running as we undertake this procedure.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The question before the body is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays to place the house under call, Mr. President.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The house is under call. Will all members, who are not excused, please return to the floor and record their presence. The house is under call. Senator Chambers, if you want to continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Brothers and sisters, in a pressure cooker circumstance that we face with limited time, as we have today, many things have to be expressed more forcefully than perhaps they ordinarily would be. This is not adequate time, and I am not blaming the Speaker because this is a motion to pull a bill, not discussion on the bill, itself. This is not adequate time to discuss a matter of this seriousness and magnitude. I do fault the committee for not sending it to the floor, and I do fault them for the way they handled it. And I don't care how many other bills they killed, we understand the symbolism which sometimes has more actual impact than a reality. We might kill 30 bills, one right after the other, and then another one is there, but because of
